14. All Heads of the Departments : Forenoon and Afternoon Sessions

1. Recitation from the Holy Quran:

The meeting commenced with the recitation of the verses from the Holy Quran and their translation in English by Mrs. Rasheeda Banu, Assistant Professor, Department of Home Science.

2. Welcome Address:

Dr. Shanaz Ahamed, the Chairperson and the Principal of the College welcomed the University Nominees, the Management Nominees, the Correspondent, the Controller of Examinations, Vice-Principals of the Forenoon and Afternoon Sessions and all the Heads of the Departments of the Forenoon and Afternoon Sessions and the Academic Council Members to the Sixteenth meeting of the Academic Council.

3. Result Analysis:

The Principal read out the Result Analysis for the October 2014 Examinations of the Undergraduate, Postgraduate and M.Phil. courses of both the Forenoon & Afternoon Sessions.

<u>Forenoon Session</u>: The overall pass percentage for the Undergraduate Courses was as follows:

October 2014:

I Semester 89%, III Semester 91% V Semester 90%

In the I Semester, B.Sc. Psychology, B.Sc. Chemistry, B.Sc. Nutrition, Food Service Management & Dietetics, B.Sc. Clinical Nutrition & Dietetics and B.Sc. Interior Design and Décor secured 100% results. In the III Semester, B.Sc. Chemistry, B.Sc. Advanced Zoology & Biotechnology, B.Sc. Clinical Nutrition & Dietetics and B.Sc. Interior Design & Decor secured 100% results. In the V Semester, B.Sc. Psychology secured 100% results.

The overall pass percentage for the Postgraduate Courses was as follows:

I Semester 90% III Semester 97%

Among the Postgraduate departments, M.Sc. Child Development & Child Nutrition secured 100% results in the I Semester. In the III Semester, M.Sc. Applied Psychology, M.Sc. Zoology and M.Sc. Textile Science and Fashion Designing secured 100% results.

In the M.Phil. course, the departments of Zoology, Textiles & Clothing, Human Development and Family Studies, Psychology and Commerce secured 100% results. The overall pass percentage was 100%.

In the V Semester B.Sc. Electronics and Communication Science secured 100% results.

The overall pass percentage for the Postgraduate Courses was as follows:

I Semester 92%

III Semester 78%

V Semester (M.C.A.) 100%

Among the Postgraduate departments, M.A. Corporate Economics, M.Sc. Applied Microbiology and M.Sc. Computer Science secured 100% Results and M.Sc. Computer Science secured 100% results in the I Semester. In the III Semester, M.Sc. Mathematics, M.Sc. Computer Science and M.C.A. secured 100% results. In the V Semester, M.C.A. secured 100% results.

Among the Language departments, French secured 100% results in the I semester. In the III Semester, the departments of Urdu and Sanskrit secured 100% results.

Mr. A.S.M. Jan, Management Nominee, wanted to know the reasons for the poor performance of students in Historical Studies (III Year – 37%). Mrs. S. Nazeemunnisa Begum, Head, Department of Historical Studies replied that the paper on Constitutional History was easy according to feedback from the students. She also added that the students were not willing to apply for revaluation as the amount of Rs.750/- was unaffordable. They preferred to appear for the failed subject as an arrear as the amount was only Rs.150/-.

The Controller of Examinations responded that the revaluation amount of Rs.750/- is refunded in the event of the candidate passing the examination.

PRINCIPAL

Dr. R. Malathi, University Nominee also observed the poor performance of students in the III Semester (54%) in the Department of Plant Biology and Plant Biotechnology. Mrs. D.A. Shahira Banu, Head, Department of Plant Biology and Plant Biotechnology responded that the reason could be due to the distribution of the units in the subjects and this has been remedied in the Board of Studies of 2015.

Dr. R. Malathi, University Nominee observed that the results in the Afternoon Session was considerably low in comparison with the Forenoon Session. The Principal said that meritorious students are admitted in the Forenoon Session. Dr. Malathi suggested that extra coaching should be given to the students. The Principal assured the Council that no compromise is made with regard to the quality of teaching and high standards are maintained.
